## HORIZON UPDATES "DEEP LACUNA" SURVEY

Horizon released an updated report of their surveys of the network of tunnels underneath Los Angeles. Their continued explorations of the "Deep Lacuna" has shown the network of tunnels is significantly larger and deeper than previously thought - with at least one tunnel more than 1,000 meters below the surface.

The Deep Lacuna first came to light in 2070 during surveys to update geospatial terrain databases following the March 8, "Fall" earthquakes. Horizon geologists quickly realized that the terrain elevation changes were much larger than earthquakes even as strong as the 9.2 and 9.6 Fall earthquakes could cause. While their initial surveys was unable to explain the unusually large elevation changes that submerged much of the city, they did discover a previously unknown network of tunnels.

Nearly a decade of study has not shed much light on the origins of the tunnels. Geologists have no explanation for how the tunnels formed, or even when. Dr. Tanaka McShae, of Horizon Deep Lacuna Survey Corp, says that while the tunnels show signs of being millions of years old, they are apparently a new feature. "Previous seismic studies and test bore databases, while heavily corrupted during the Crashes, show no evidence of the tunnel network. The petrochemical companies had been drilling here for a century or more. If the tunnels were there, they would have been noticed by *somebody*. We are forced to conclude that the tunnels are a recent phenomena, linked to the Fall quakes in a manner we have yet to determine."

The total size of the tunnel network continues to defy analysis. "We are finding new tunnels all the time. As soon as we think we have a handle on it, we find a whole new section."

The report also stresses the dangers in the tunnels, noting that many of them are extensively contaminated by toxins and formerly-buried pollutants. Out of concern for public safety, Horizon has cordoned off several of the more toxic tunnels to prevent those pollutants from spreading, and to prevent exposure.

## ARES REFIT DELAYED ARES

The much-discussed "refit and reset" of Ares Corporate Military Forces (ACMF) is apparently taking longer than Ares had planned. Anonymous sources within Ares Defense have stated that the scope of the operations was "drastically underestimated by senior management". This corroborates several reports that Ares has invoked contract clauses notifying customers that their forces may not be able to fulfill contract terms as expected.

The UCAS Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC) has issued a formal inquiry to Ares regarding the change in their forces status. A formal announcement from the SASC issued yesterday makes their concerns clear:
